We are delighted to inform you that once again we will have a booster teacher (Mrs Mather) in Year 6 for four mornings every week. This provision will start after half term and then run through until SATs. The children will be split into three groups for English and Maths for these four days.

Hello and welcome to Year 6,

We hope that you find all of the information in this leaflet useful. If you have any further questions about the term ahead, please do let us know so that we can arrange a time to talk to you.

There are a few things that you can do to help us:

- Please ensure that your child brings their reading record and reading book to school every day. Please also encourage your child to write in their reading records daily.
- **Please ensure that your child's clothing (cardigans and jumpers in particular!) are named.**
- Please do not hesitate to let us know if your child struggles with a piece of homework (a note on the actual piece of homework, or in their reading record is fine).

Daily Routines

We encourage each child to learn and follow simple daily routines in order to make them independent and responsible for their own belongings. It would be an enormous help to the staff, and your child, if you could support this by doing the following:

- Dropping your child off promptly at the KS2 waiting area every morning, allowing them to walk into school ready for their day's learning.
- Giving your child a piece of fruit or vegetable to eat at break time. Please remember that our school policy is fresh fruit and vegetables only.
- Labelling all belongings including clothes, PE kits and shoes.
- Ensuring your child has their PE kit on the correct days. Children must take earrings out for PE. However, if a child cannot do this then please provide tape in their kits for them to be covered.
- Ensuring your child has their book bag, lunch box (if they need one) and water bottle (water only please) with them in the morning.
- Waiting for your child at the end of each day inside the KS2 waiting area.

Please do not wait on the road. Please remind your child that if for any reason they cannot find you after school they must come back and go to the school office.

Topics for this term - Year 6 are following the National Curriculum

English

Literacy lessons will continue on a daily basis. We will be studying a range of literacy genres including: spy stories, poetry, autobiographical and biographical writing and stories with a historical nature (we will look at a story based on the Suffragettes). For each unit of work the children will be reading and studying quality texts from a range of authors.

We will aim to develop the children's ability in narrative and non-narrative writing, helping them to secure the basic conventions of written English, encouraging correct usage of punctuation and spelling. In addition to this, sentence structure and grammar will also be developed so that the children's writing starts to become more sophisticated. Over the last couple of years there has been greater emphasis on the correct use of grammar, punctuation and spelling, as well as children knowing the correct terminology. All this will be taught in our lessons and through other areas of the curriculum. To help you help your child at home we will loan the children a book which explains the grammar concepts very clearly. Please also help your children learn the Year 3/4 and Year 5/6 key spelling words.

Maths

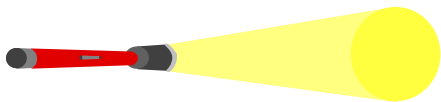
As in previous years, the daily maths lesson will include a balance of mental and written activities and will encourage the children to apply the skills they are learning. The topics covered will include number, shape, data handling, area and fractions. **A good working knowledge of times tables is essential.** Please help your child to both learn these and be able to use them quickly. Mental arithmetic homework will continue as usual and is marked in school on a Monday.

Science

This term our topics will be "Let it shine" and "Electrifying!"

Our Let it Shine topic introduces the concept of light travelling in straight lines. We will start by looking at beams of light and how light travels, to enable the children to understand how we see things. This understanding is then applied to the production of shadows and begins to look at how light is reflected. The topic then takes the learning into the realm of coloured light and rainbows, using scientific skills to raise and answer questions.



During our Electrifying unit we build on the Year 4 work on electricity, taking it into the scientific use of symbols for components in a circuit as well as considering the effect in more detail of changing components in a circuit.

RE

Our topics this term are: Creation and Questions and Christmas - Light.

During these lessons the children will learn that there are questions to which there are no universally agreed answers and consider these for themselves - using understanding of several world faiths. For our Christmas topic the children will learn to recognise and consider the significance of light in their own lives and celebrations as well as revisiting the Christmas story.

Computing

Computing is used regularly across the curriculum, focussing heavily on e-safety.

We are also currently looking at purchasing a new computer scheme - to help teach the children some more specific and transferrable skills. More details to follow.

History/Geography

This term we will be exploring two new topics. In Geography, we will be finding out about North, South and Central America and this study will link to our History topic about the Mayan people of Central America.

Personal Social and Health Education (PSHE)

Some of the themes to be covered this term using SEAL materials:

- New Beginnings
- Relationships
- Say No to bullying

Art

Our Art theme for this term will be linked to our topic work - The Americas and The Mayans. In addition to this, the children will undertake a whole school art project creating a historical timeline. We will also carry out a number of Christmas art activities, including the PTFA Christmas cards.

Design and Technology

This term we focus on art. Next term, we will look at 'Bridges'.

French

In French our topic is L'argent de poche (Pocket Money) Children will continue to gain confidence in manipulating numbers and learn further expressions for likes and dislikes. They begin to learn about the euro. They prepare and perform an advertisement for a toy. Our second topic is Raconte-moi une histoire (Tell me a story). Children will work on sounds and spellings and continue to gain confidence in manipulating numbers, learning multiples of 10 to 100. They learn some common adjectives, revise how to make simple feminine agreements and give instructions. The topic is based on the story of Sleeping Beauty. Please help your child to practice their French by encouraging them to share the vocabulary they have learnt in lessons. We would like to continue offering the children in Year 6 the opportunity to read in French and would ask you to contact us, via the office, if you are a French speaker and feel able to help ideally for an hour on a Friday afternoon.

Music

In music, we will be studying complex rhythms using Djembe Drums; learning songs for Christmas and in line with the new National Curriculum, we will be learning about the Baroque, Classical and Romantic Eras, focusing on the works of composers from each period.

Homework

This term we will be sending homework as follows:

- **Reading** please ensure that your child continues to read at home every evening for at least 10 minutes and that you complete their Reading Record book by commenting daily and signing it at the end of each week. It is also beneficial if you read to your child whenever possible.
- **Spellings/Literacy** - The children have been taught to practise spellings using the 'look, say, cover, write, check,' method and other spelling strategies. In class, we will also be revising and consolidating spelling rules. For more information please read the letter which has been placed in the front of their homework books. Homework will go out on a Friday and is due in on the Thursday of the following week. See the weekly spelling sheet for homework tasks.
- **Maths** homework will be in the form of the Mental Maths book and must be in school for marking every **Monday** morning. We will mark their books together and it is expected that the children complete any corrections at home. However, please encourage your child to ask their teacher for further clarification, if they do not understand a question.
- **Curriculum based homework** - during this term the children may be given topic related homework instead of one long term project. This will help us support the new National Curriculum and further prepare your child for secondary school.

Ways to help your child in Year 6

Your child should still be **reading everyday** so please encourage this. It is also useful to check reading records regularly for any information about homework etc and sign at the bottom at least once a week. Please continue to hear your child read too.

- ☺ If you still have your 'writing pyramid' at home, help your child to vary their sentences when writing. **Use the school website (Year 6 class section) for resources.**
- ☺ Help your child develop their mental maths - see our Basic Essential List on the school website
- ☺ Encourage your child to come to school prepared for the day ahead with a pencil, blue pen (not biro), green pen, ruler, rubber, glue stick and any homework needed for that day.
- ☺ Ensure PE kit is in school on the correct days.
- ☺ Talk to your child about the topics we are covering in school.

Looking Smart in School Uniform

Our school uniform is simple and practical, intended to keep the children looking smart and contributing to a feeling of belonging to the school.

Girls

- White blouse or polo shirt.
- Grey skirt or pinafore dress, or tailored trousers.
- Maroon school sweatshirt or cardigan.
- In the winter, grey socks or grey tights.
- In the summer, pink (not red) check cotton dress and plain white socks.



Boys

- White polo shirt.
- Grey long trousers.
- Maroon school sweatshirt.
- Plain grey socks.

All children also require:

- Plain sensible black shoes (not boots, sandals or trainers).
- Small school bag (to fit on their peg)
- Water bottle.
- School sun hat (if needed)

Sports

- Coloured house T-shirt (Blue - Normans, Red - Vikings, Green - Romans, Yellow - Saxons).
- Plain black cotton P.E. shorts
- Trainers for outdoor games
- Tracksuits may be worn for outside games in colder weather

It is helpful if the children keep their P.E. kit in a named drawstring bag to hang on their peg rather than a backpack or a large kitbag. If for any reason your child can not do P.E., or does not have the correct kit, please can you notify the class teacher in the form of a note. Thank you.

Jewellery, hair and nails

We do not allow jewellery in school as it can be a source of danger in P.E. and swimming. Pierced ears should have a stud only. Earrings have to be removed or taped for P.E. and swimming lessons. Please provide a roll of tape in your child's PE bag if they are going to tape their ears.

All long hair **must** be tied back for games and swimming lessons.

We would also appreciate it, if children with long hair could tie it back during the general school day with plain and simple bands, clips or ribbons in brown, black or maroon.

Boys' hair should be a traditional style and neither too short or too long. No 'fashion' cuts are allowed.

Nail varnish should be removed before the start of each school day.

The school and Local Authority do not accept liability for loss or damage to personal property and we therefore do not encourage children to bring such items, including toys to school. Mobile phones are not permitted unless prior consent has been given from Mrs Westley.

E-Safety

Below is some important information on the school's policies on taking photographs of children as well as a copy of the e-safety agreement that the children sign.

Using Images Safely and Responsibly

We all enjoy and treasure images of our family and friends. Our new born baby, first steps, family events, holidays and school events are moments we all like to capture in photos or on video.

Are there any risks?

Facts

- Once online any image or video can be copied and stay online forever.
- Some children are at risk and **MUST NOT** have their image put online. Not all members of the school community will know who they are.
- Some people do not want their images online for personal or religious reasons.
- Some children and staff may have a complex family background which means that image sharing online can have unforeseen consequences.
