Welwyn St. Mary's Local Offer 2023-2024

Special Educational Needs and Disability (SEND)

Welwyn St Mary's C of E School is an inclusive school and may offer the following range of provision to support children with SEND. We ensure that pupils are included in all aspects of learning and school life throughout our school. From time to time some children require additional support for a set period of time to help meet their needs or improve their learning. The decision to do this is made by the school and is based on a variety of factors including academic progress, observations, discussions with parents/children and/or assessments carried out by teaching staff or other professionals. It may also be based on ensuring children have a smooth transition into school or require support when going through significant change either at home or school. Parents/carers will be informed when this happens.

Our Local Offer describes the range of provision and support available to support identified children as and when appropriate. This Offer is subject to change depending on budgetary constraints and policy review.

Provisions to support pupils with SEND

Social Skills programmes/support including strategies to enhance self-esteem

- Circle of friends
- Nurture groups with trained staff
- Social skills groups
- Talk about programmes delivered to support self-esteem, friendships, social skills awareness
- Lego Therapy

Access to a supportive environment - computing facilities/equipment/resources (inc. preparation)

- iPads
- chrome books
- computer programmes to support reading (Lexia) and maths (TT Rockstars)
- Specialised equipment, where needed

Strategies/programmes to support speech and language

- Speech and Language programmes delivered by trained staff
- Dedicated TA trained in Elklan strategies supports staff and children across year
 R-4
- Advice followed from speech and language professionals
- Wellcom support in Reception

Wellbeing support activities

- Mentoring, small group and 1:1 sessions weekly for identified groups or children
- Protective Behaviours programme

- Language for thinking
- Bereavement support
- Self-esteem building
- Support with organisation and learning targets
- Transition programmes

Access to strategies/programmes to support Occupational Therapy or Physiotherapy needs

- Fine motor skills activity boxes where needed
- Sensory circuits where needed
- Specialist equipment
- Advice followed from professionals

Strategies to reduce anxiety/promote emotional wellbeing (including communication with parents)

- Home school communication books
- Wellbeing groups
- Individual reward systems
- Zones of Regulation programme
- Growth Mindset promoted across the school
- Mindfulness activities in classes, 1:1 and small groups
- Drawing and talking programme

Strategies to support/develop literacy including reading

- Provision of table top packs, containing high frequency word mats and phonics sound mats
- Lexia
- Small group reading support in class through guided reading and individual reading
- Reading support outside of class from volunteers
- Targeted support from Outreach and specialist teachers
- Small group phonic interventions Rapid catch up Little Wandle
- 1:1 phonic interventions Catch Up programme Little Wandle

Strategies to support behaviour

- Positive behaviour system STEPs therapeutic approach to behaviour
- Reward charts
- Individual risk management plans
- Regular checking in using the Zones of Regulation
- Pastoral support plans
- Mentoring
- Nurture/social skills groups

Strategies to support/develop numeracy

- Adaptive strategies visual support 100sq, maths mats, white boards
- Use of support manipulatives such as Numicon, diennes, rekenrek, cubes,
- Provision of table top resources to ensure that learning is multi-sensory and practical
- Small group interventions
- 1:1 interventions

Targeted support from Outreach services and specialist teachers - where applicable

Provision to facilitate/support access to the curriculum

- Differentiated planning and teaching strategies to meet individual needs
- Appropriate resources word maps, visual resources, manipulatives, task plans, chrome books
- Range of teaching strategies to meet needs; visual, auditory and kinaesthetic
- Specialist equipment, where necessary

Strategies/support to develop independent learning

- Facilitating access to learning through the appropriate adaption of tasks and activities
- Provision of resources to enhance independent learning including high frequency word lists, easy grip writing tools and multi-sensory resources
- Clear learning intentions and success criteria
- Provision of individual/visual timetables and checklists and task boards
- Reward/motivation charts
- Small group support in class from teacher or TA
- Visual support
- Provision of sand timers where appropriate
- Scaffolding e.g. writing frames, story maps
- Additional resources if appropriate

Support/supervision at unstructured times of the day

- Lunchtime nurture group The Den
- Trained midday meals supervisors in the dining hall and playgrounds
- Midday meals supervisors initiating and supporting activities during lunchtime
- Responsible people (Year 6s) helping in KS1 and KS2 playground
- Timetabled activities for each year group
- Consistent positive behaviour system in place

Planning and assessment

- All learning within class is pitched at an appropriate level so that all children are
 able to access according to their specific needs. Typically this might mean that in a
 lesson there would be three different levels of work set for the class, however on
 occasions this can be individually differentiated.
- The benefit of this type of differentiation is that all children can access a lesson and learn at their levels.
- The class teacher continually assesses each child and notes areas where they are improving and where further support is needed. As a school, we track children's progress from entry at Reception through to Year 6, using a variety of different methods including Hertfordshire Steps, Little Wandle phonic assessments and HfL's Essential maths diagnostic assessments
- Individual provision maps are written termly to support children who need extra support in particular areas. The maps identify different interventions that support children's learning. These are reviewed and amended following the intervention and assessment of individual children's needs.

Liaison/Communication with Professionals/Parents, attendance at meetings and preparation of reports

- Early identification of needs requiring referral to external professionals
- Regular communication and information sharing with an extensive range of external agencies such as; CAMHSs, Step 2, Family Support Workers, Specialist Advisory Support (SAS) teams, Speech and Language therapists, Occupational Therapists, Physiotherapists, play therapists, counsellors and school nurses team.
- Sharing of professional reports with parents
- Regular progress meetings with parents/carers by class teacher and SENCO, where necessary
- Early Help Modules (EHM) and meetings convened where 2 or more outside agencies are involved.
- Support for parents who have concerns

Access to Medical Interventions

 The school has a policy regarding the administration and managing of medicines on the school site.
