

Routines


We encourage each child to learn and follow simple daily routines in order to make them independent and responsible for their own belongings. It would be an enormous help to your child and staff if you could support this by doing the following:

- Dropping your child off promptly (at 8.35 a.m) at the KS2 waiting area every morning allowing them to come straight in to school ready to start the day.
- Giving your child a piece of fruit (or vegetable) to eat at break time.
- Ensuring your child has their book bag and lunch box (if they need one) with them in the morning.
- Waiting for your child at the end of each day (3.20pm) at the KS2 waiting area along the side of the school and not on the driveway.

Topics

<u>English</u>

In English lessons, children are taught speaking, listening, reading and writing skills through studying a variety of styles of writing (genres).




The more that you read, the more things you will know. The more that you learn, the more places you will go. --Dr. Seuss

Your child will be part of guided reading session where they develop their reading and comprehension skills with their teacher. Please ensure that your child continues to read at home every day for at least 10 minutes and that you complete their Home Learning Record book by commenting and signing it at the end of each week. We would ask you to continue to hear your child read and ask questions about the text as often as you can. Explore new words and phrases together and talk about the characters. Mathematics

Maths is taught every day using the National Curriculum and the Essential Maths scheme of work from Herts for Learning. All areas of study will be covered this term to develop pupils' mathematical fluency.

Your support in helping your child consolidate their basic skills would be

greatly beneficial.

This could include:

ensuring that your child is confident in applying their knowledge of number bonds to work out both addition and subtraction facts for numbers up to 100. For example, 23 + ?? = 100 or 100 - 43 = ??



- counting forwards and backwards from any number in steps of 3, 4, 8, 50 and 100 from any given number
- using different vocabulary for all the operations.

This term we will continue to focus on learning the 3, 4 and 8 times tables together with the 2, 10, and 5. By the end of Y3 children are expected to know 2, 3, 4, 5, 8 and 10 times tables and the corresponding division facts. Every Friday, your child is tested on their times tables so please continue to support your child to learn them at home. You can find a useful vocabulary list, some games you might wish to play with your child and a document outlining the progression of written methods in mathematics. We may also set them some extra activities on their Purple Mash account to help consolidate their understanding.

<u>RE</u>

This term we cover two topics in our Religious Education lesson. First, we will be looking at the story of Noah in the Bible and linking this to the idea of promises and how we live in school and the wider world. We will also be studying Easter. We will be focusing on retelling the story, understanding the importance of Lent and discussing why this is such a special time for Christians.

<u>Science</u>

Our science topics for this term are 'Rocks and soils' and 'Plants'. Through these topics children will develop their scientific skills, making careful observations, learning to plan simple investigations, understand how to make them fair, and drawing conclusions from their results which they will present in a range of ways. They will be encouraged to develop skills in questioning outcomes and refining their investigative expertise.



Computing

In computing, we use the NCCE scheme of work to support the curriculum. We are looking at branching databases and desktop publishing. Any help with developing familiarisation of the keyboard, and touch typing would be very beneficial for your child.

<u>History</u>

This term we are continuing to learn all about 'The Ancient Greeks'. Your child will be finding out about the wars between the Greeks and the

Persians, Gods and Goddesses, the Greek alphabet, pottery and drama as well as researching everyday life and making comparisons about what it was like to live in different strata of society.

We end our topic with Our Greek Day. The children will enjoy taking part in a variety of activities such as being an apprentice and making goods to sell, gossiping in a Greek market, eating Greek food, role playing the Battle of Marathon and entertaining guests with songs and plays. Further details about this amazing day will follow soon.

Design & Technology and Art

'Mazes' – this topic links to our work on the Ancient Greeks and the myth of Theseus and the Minotaur. The children will design and make their own mini

labyrinth. They will learn some simple wood work techniques – including how to use a saw safely! When we get started on the practical aspects of this topic help from parents would be much appreciated; we'll send out an SOS nearer the time!

<u>PE</u>

Please remember that long hair must be tied back and earrings removed or covered up. We will be developing orienteering skills and creating a dance for our production before half term. After half term the focus will be dodgeball and indoor athletics.

<u>Music</u>

Music will be taught on a two-weekly basis by Mrs Harrison, lead of music at St Mary's. Topics covered will be practised and reinforced on the alternate weeks in class. Our topic this term is on the theme of 'Animals'.

<u>French</u>

Madame Farrington will be teaching French and lessons will be reinforced regularly. Our topic in French this term is called Les Jeux et Chansons (Games and Songs) We will start with a version of The Farmers in his Den and will be discussing nouns and gender. We will continue with some French rhymes, including counting rhymes. We will extend our counting and recognition of numbers to 20. Finally, we will learn how to

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describe playground games in French and will read and write simple sentences expressing a preference. We will continue to develop our recognition of sounds.

<u>Homework</u>

In line with the school policy on homework this term we will be sending homework as follows:

- **Reading:** as mentioned above, please ensure that your child continues to read at home and hear them as often as possible. Every evening for at least 10 minutes would be ideal. Please ensure that you complete their Home Learning Record book by commenting daily and signing it at the end of each week. It is also beneficial if you read to your child whenever possible. Please see reading guidance attached.
- **Spelling:** homework will be given out on a Monday and tested the following Monday. The children have been taught to practise spellings using the 'look, say, cover, write, check,' method and other spelling strategies. In class we will also be revising and consolidating their phonic knowledge. Thank you for supporting your child with his or her spelling homework.
- Maths: it would be greatly beneficial to your child if you continue to practise and consolidate basic skills (please see Maths section). We will continue with times tables test on Fridays see your child's book for the tables they need to learn please make sure they learn the division facts along with the multiplication facts. Further to this they will continue with their maths workbooks which will support their learning in class. They will usually be given out on a Friday and must be returned by the following Wednesday.

Jewellery

The only permitted jewellery that may be worn is:

• One pair of stud earrings (no other piercings are permitted). Earrings must be taken out or taped for PE.

• A sensible wristwatch (a smartwatch maybe worn if classroom mode is enabled at all times), whilst on the school site and school trips etc.

Jewellery is the responsibility of the pupil and not the school.

Hair

• Long hair needs to be tied back for school, this is for safety and hygiene reasons and to ensure that children's vision is not impeded. Hair should not be cut too short and should not have designs / tramlines shaven into it.

• Hairstyles should be smart and moderate in style. Brightly coloured hair is not permitted.

• Large, excessive hair accessories should not be worn; however, small hair clips or plain headbands or ribbons in brown, black or maroon are acceptable.

At the Headteacher's discretion, there may be exceptions to the above in extreme circumstances e.g. a pupil may be permitted to cover their hair if they have hair loss / illness etc.

Make-Up

Pupils are not allowed to wear make-up or nail varnish. False nails are not permitted.

Labelling

All clothing, shoes, water bottles and school bags should be clearly labelled with your child's name. Any lost clothing is to be taken to the lost property box. All lost property is retained for a term and is disposed of if it is not collected within this time.

The school and Local Authority do not accept liability for loss or damage to personal property and we therefore do not encourage children to bring such items, including toys, to school.

Using Images Safely and Responsibly

We all enjoy and treasure images of our family and friends. Our new born baby, first steps, family events, holidays and school events are moments we all like to capture in photos or on video.

We then have the added and exciting dimension of adding our images and video to our social network, such as Facebook, YouTube and many other online websites. This means that we can easily share our photos and video with family and friends.

Whilst this is naturally useful, in schools and educational settings we do need to protect and safeguard all children and staff in our school, including those who do not want to have their images stored online.

Online Images and Video. *What should we think about before adding online any images or video? Are there any risks?*

Facts

- > Once online any image or video can be copied and stay online forever.
- Some children are at risk and MUST NOT have their image put online. Not all members of the school community will know who they are.
- > Some people do not want their images online for personal or religious reasons.
- Some children and staff may have a complex family background which means that image sharing online can have unforeseen consequences.

We must all 'Think Before We Post' Online

At Welwyn St. Mary's School we are happy for parents and carers to take photos and video of the school events and productions for *personal use* but request that these images are <u>not distributed or put online</u>. This is to protect all members of the school community

<u>Please note</u>: From time to time we use photographs of our pupils to promote and celebrate the good work in our school. This might be on our website or in paper form to carefully selected audiences. We never publish a child's name alongside their photograph for reasons of safety. If you do not wish your child's be photograph to be used in this way please send a letter in to your child's teacher.



Pupil Acceptable Use Agreement / E- Safety Rules.

- I will only use ICT in school for school purposes.
- I will only use my class e-mail address or my own school e-mail address when e-mailing
- I will only open e-mail attachments from people I know, or who my teacher has approved.
 - I will not tell other people my ICT passwords.
 - I will only open / delete my own file.
- I will make sure that all ICT content with other children and adults is responsible, sensible and polite.
- I will not deliberately look for, save or send anything that could be unpleasant or nasty. If I accidentally find anything like this I will tell my teacher immediately.
- I will not give out my own details such as my name, 'phone number or home address. I will not arrange to meet someone unless this is part of a school project approved by my school teacher and an adult comes with me.
- I will be responsible for my behaviour when using ICT because I know that these rules keep me safe.
- I know that my use of ICT can be checked and that my parent / carer will be contacted of a member of staff is concerned about my E Safety.
