### <u>MATHS</u>



The mathematics curriculum in the summer term continues to build on the skills and topics for Year 4 and includes securing number facts, measure, time, data handling, geometry, revisiting fractions, multiplication and division, with a focus on 'using and applying'.

We are continuing to learn and practise our times tables, with corresponding division facts, up to 12. The children will complete the statutory Multiplication Tables Check shortly after May Half Term. Thank you for your continued support in developing accuracy and fluency in this life-skill.

### <u>ENGLISH</u>



English will continue to develop written, reading and oral communication skills. This term we are developing persuasive writing, poetry, narratives and nonchronological reports.

Through Guided Reading, the children will further their comprehension skills and build up new vocabulary.

Please ensure that your child continues to read at home every evening for at least 10 minutes and that you complete their Home Learning Journal by commenting daily and signing it at the end of each week. It is also beneficial if you discuss the author's use of language and consider its effectiveness.

### <u>RE</u>

We will conclude our study of Sikhism by looking at practices and ceremonies. Our focus for Christianity will be 'Gospel' looking at the parable of the Good Samaritan and the importance of charity in Christian life.

### **SCIENCE**



In science, we will be studying Sound. We will encounter how sounds are made using a variety of instruments and how they can be changed in volume, pitch and over distance. We will explore making sounds on a range of objects that aren't instruments, in order to investigate how sounds are created to make music.

We will also explore States of Matter. We will compare and group materials together, according to whether they are solids, liquids or gases. We will observe that some materials change state when heated or cooled.

### **GEOGRAPHY and HISTORY – Local study**



In this topic, we will be studying the area we live in. We will be learning about land use, topography, looking at physical and human features in the locality. We will also be improving our map skills and create our own maps of the area, becoming familiar with a variety of map types. Included in the topic will be fieldwork in the local area.

**<u>HISTORY</u>** continued – we will complete our study of Romans in Britain and enjoy a trip to Verulamium Museum in St Albans.

### ART, DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGY



In the first half term, we will explore sculpture, looking at how sculpture has changed through history and comparing pieces by different artists. Children will use found materials, paper and wire to construct their own sculptures on different themes. In Design and Technology, we will design and sew our own money holders.

### <u>PSHE</u>

During the first half term we will look at Relationships: jealousy, love and loss, memories, falling out and getting on, and special relationships. After half term, we will study Changing Me: our own uniqueness, naming body parts, internal and external, involved in conception, how a girl's body changes during puberty (menstruation), and thinking about identifying and managing changes in our own lives. These lessons will be taught to the class by their class teacher. For Lime Class, these sessions will be in addition to the 'Me and My Emotions' sessions.

### **COMPUTING**

In the first half term, children will explore how digital images can be edited in different ways, e.g. rotating, cropping, recolouring and adding filters. They will consider when/if it is necessary/appropriate to edit images and how photographers use this technique in different scenarios.

# MUSIC

This term, Mrs Dunstan will teach both classes how to play instruments. Limes will learn how to play the jSax and Larches will learn the clarinéo. The children will work towards a concert for parents at the end of term.

**FRENCH** French lessons this term will be taught by Madame Elena our new MFL teacher.

### <u>Jewellery</u>

The only permitted jewellery that may be worn is:

- One pair of stud earrings (no other piercings are permitted). Earrings must be taken out or taped for PE.
- A sensible wristwatch (a smartwatch maybe worn if classroom mode is enabled at all times), whilst on the school site and school trips etc.

Jewellery is the responsibility of the pupil and not the school.

### <u>Hair</u>

Long hair needs to be tied back for school, this is for safety and hygiene reasons and to ensure that children's vision is not impeded. Hair should not be cut too short and should not have designs / tramlines shaven into it.

Hairstyles should be smart and moderate in style. Brightly coloured hair is not permitted.

Large, excessive hair accessories should not be worn; however, small hair clips or plain headbands or ribbons in brown, black or maroon are acceptable.

At the Headteacher's discretion, there may be exceptions to the above in extreme circumstances e.g. a pupil may be permitted to cover their hair if they have hair loss / illness etc.

### <u>Make-Up</u>

Pupils are not allowed to wear make-up or nail varnish. False nails are not permitted.

### Labelling

All clothing, shoes, water bottles and school bags should be clearly labelled with your child's name. Any lost clothing is to be taken to the lost property box. All lost property is retained for a term and is disposed of if it is not collected within this time.
