

Facts about the River Nile

- Found in northeast Africa, the Nile has long been recognised as the longest river in the world stretching a massive 6,695km! There is some debate over this title, though some scientists argue that the Amazon river in South America is longer.
- The Nile is often associated with Egypt, but in fact, it flows through 11 countries: Tanzania, Uganda, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Rwanda, Burundi, Ethiopia, Kenya, Eritrea, South Sudan, Sudan and Egypt.
- This mighty river has two main tributaries (branches, or smaller rivers or streams) which meet to form 'the Nile'. One tribut ary is called the White Nile, which starts in South Sudan, and the other is called the Blue Nile, which starts in Ethiopia.

• The Nile has been an important source of life for people throughout history. Around 5,000 years ago, the Ancient Egyptians relied on the Nile for fresh water, food and transportation. It also provided them with fertile land to farm on.
