Hello and welcome to Year 6,

We hope that you find all the information in this leaflet useful. If you have any further questions about the term ahead, please do let us know so that we can arrange a time to talk to you.

There are a few things that you can do to help us:

- Please ensure that your child brings their Home Learning Record and reading book to school every day and that they have noted down their daily reading. Please also try to hear your child read daily and read to them too - so much can be gained from modelled reading. Please also write in the Home Learning Record when you have read to your child and sign the record daily to show you have checked your child has read. In secondary school, the children are expected to read daily and sign this off too.
- Please ensure that your child's clothing (cardigans and jumpers, in particular) are all named.
- Please feel free to support your child with their homework and do not hesitate to let
 us know if your child struggles with something in particular (a note on the actual piece
 of homework, or in their Home Learning Record is fine).

Daily Routines

We encourage each child to learn and follow simple daily routines, in order to make them independent and responsible for their own belongings. It would be an enormous help to the staff, and your child, if you could support this by doing the following:

- Dropping your child off promptly, as per the current drop-off plan, allowing them to walk into school ready for their day's learning.
- Giving your child a piece of fruit or vegetable to eat at break time. Please remember that our school policy is fresh fruit and vegetables only.
- Labelling all belongings including clothes, PE kits and shoes.
- Ensuring your child comes to school in their PE kit on their PE day. Children must take
 earrings out for PE. However, if a child cannot do this, then please provide tape for
 them to be covered.
- Ensuring your child has their reading book and Home Learning Record, lunch box (if they need one) and water bottle (water only please) with them in the morning.
- Wait for your child at the end of each day, following our current procedures.

Year 6 are following the National Curriculum. Our topics for this term:

English

English lessons will be on a daily basis. We will be studying a range of genres using a variety of books as a stimulus:

- Night of the Gargoyles by Eve Bunting and David Weisner; narrative
- Planetarium by Raman Prinja and Chris Wormell and Professor Astro Cat's Frontiers of Space by Dr Dominic Walliman and Ben Newman non fiction
- Wisp by Zana Fraillon and Graham Baker Smith narrative
- Talking History by Dr Joan Lennon and Dr Joan Haig persuasion/speeches

We will aim to develop the children's ability in narrative and non-narrative writing, helping them to secure the basic conventions of written English, encouraging correct usage of punctuation and spelling. In addition to this, sentence structure and grammar will also be developed so that the children's writing starts to become more sophisticated. We place great emphasis on the correct use of grammar, punctuation and spelling, as well as children knowing the correct terminology. All this will be taught in our lessons and through other areas of the curriculum. To help your child at home, we will loan the children a book which explains the grammar concepts very clearly (this book <u>must</u> be returned after SATs). Please help your child learn the Year 3/4 and Year 5/6 key spelling words.

Reading is a key part of learning and a key focus during our English lessons. The children will also take part in guided reading sessions where reading skills and understanding are explicitly taught. This term 6 Redwoods are reading Wonder and 6 Rowans are reading Malala.

<u>Maths</u>

As in previous years, the daily maths lesson will include a balance of fluency and written activities and will encourage the children to apply the skills they are learning. The topics covered will include: number, shape, data handling, area and fractions. A good working knowledge of times tables is essential. Each child has a Times Table Rock Star login which is a quick and easy website and app for the children to practise daily. https://play.ttrockstars.com/auth/school/student. Please help your child to both learn these, and be able to use them quickly. We now have a box in our Home Learning Record for parents to sign in order to show that this is happening. Mental arithmetic homework will continue as usual and is marked in school on a Monday.

Science

This term our topics will be: Light and Animals including humans.

Our 'Light' unit takes children through lessons where they learn how to: recognise that light appears to travel in straight lines; use the idea that light travels in straight lines to explain that objects are seen because they give out or reflect light into the eye; explain that we see things because light travels from light sources to our eyes or from light sources to objects and then to our eyes; and finally, children learn how to use the idea that light travels in straight lines to explain why shadows have the same shape as the objects that cast them.



During our unit 'Animals, including humans' children learn how to: identify and name the main parts of the human circulatory system, and describe the functions of the heart, blood vessels and blood; recognise the impact of diet, exercise, drugs and lifestyle on the way their bodies function; and finally, they learn how to describe the ways in which nutrients and water are transported within animals, including humans.

RE

Our topics this term are: Creation, Questions, Christmas and Incarnation. During these lessons, the children will learn that there are questions to which there are no universally agreed answers and consider these for themselves - using understanding of several world faiths. For our 'Christmas' lessons the children will learn about the story of Christmas, (including the idea of Jesus being the 'word incarnate').

Computing

The first unit the children will explore how data is transferred over the internet. It is called Communication and Collaboration. They initially focus on addressing, before they move on to the makeup and structure of data packets. The children will then look at how the internet facilitates online communication and collaboration; they complete shared projects online and evaluate different methods of communication. Finally, they learn how to communicate responsibly by considering what should and should not be shared on the internet. The children will be introduced to creating websites for a chosen purpose and identify what makes a good web page and use this information to design and evaluate their own website using Google Sites. Throughout the process, the children pay specific attention to copyright and fair use of media, the aesthetics of the site, and navigation paths.

During the second half term, we move to a new topic called Web page creation.

Geography

Our topic is called The America's. In this topic we look at continents and oceans, climates, biomes and make comparisons between the UK and America. This study will link to our history topic which we still start after half-term about the Mayan people of Central America.

Personal Social and Health Education (PSHE)

For our PSHE lessons we follow a scheme called Jigsaw and our topics this term will be Being Me and Celebrating Difference.

In addition to this, we take part in a programme called Positive Minds from Watford Football Club Community Sport and Education Trust. Positive Minds Education is a 10-week wellbeing programme combining classroom and practical-based activities to engage Year 6 students in the topic of mental health.

<u>Art</u>

Our art theme for this term will look at 'People in Motion', drawing bodies in motion with accuracy, then making a design suitable to turn into a sculpture. We will also carry out several Christmas art activities, including the PTFA Christmas card project.

Design and Technology

This half term, we will be learning about the structure of bridges, building up to the task of designing, making and analysing our own bridge constructions. Before the children begin to design their own bridge, they undertake some investigations, exploring pillars, beams, trusses, arches and suspension bridges.

French

Our topic in French is called Vive le sport, our sporting lives. Children will learn how to say that they take part in various sports and activities. They will learn the names of some foods and drinks associated with healthy and unhealthy lifestyles. They will also revise the days of the week and learn how to ask and answer questions about what activities they do on particular days. Please help your child to practise their French by encouraging them to share the vocabulary they have learnt in lessons. Children are encouraged to log on to Babelzone which contains a wealth of resources, including stories, songs and games to support their language learning. The username is welwyn and the password is french.

Music

In music, we will be learning about the genre of Jazz, in particular, looking at improvisation. Closer to Christmas, we will be learning seasonal songs in preparation for our Christmas service at church.

Homework

This term we will be sending homework as follows:

- Reading please ensure that your child continues to read at home every evening for at least 10 minutes and that they complete their Home Learning Record book by commenting daily. It is also beneficial to hear your child read daily and for them to be read to.
- Spellings/English The children have been taught to practise spellings using the 'look, say, cover, write, check,' method and other spelling strategies. In class, we will also be revising and consolidating spelling rules. Homework will go out on a Friday and is due in on the Thursday of the following week. Our spelling test is also on Thursday each week. See the weekly spelling sheet for the homework task each week.
- Maths homework will be in the form of the Mental Maths book and must be in school
 for marking every Monday morning. We will mark their books together and it is
 expected that the children complete any corrections at home. However, please
 encourage your child to ask their teacher for further clarification, if they do not
 understand a question. In addition to this, we would like the children to be learning
 their multiplication facts daily please use the space in the home learning record to
 show your child is doing this.
- Curriculum based homework during this term the children may be given topic related homework instead of one long-term project. This will help us support the National Curriculum and further prepare your child for secondary school.

Ways to help your child in Year 6

- © Read with your child daily.
- © Support them with their homework. Allocate a time and a quiet space for homework.
- © Use the school website (Year 6 class section) for resources.
- Help your child develop their mental maths see our Basic Essential List on the school website
- Encourage your child to come to school prepared for the day ahead with a pencil, blue pen (not biro), green pen, ruler, rubber, glue stick and any homework needed for that day.
- © Talk to your child about the topics we are covering in school.

Jewellery

The only permitted jewellery that may be worn is:

- One pair of stud earnings (no other piercings are permitted). Earnings must be taken out or taped for PE.
- A sensible wristwatch (a smartwatch maybe worn if classroom mode is enabled at all times), whilst on the school site and school trips etc.

Jewellery is the responsibility of the pupil and not the school.

Hair

Long hair needs to be tied back for school, this is for safety and hygiene reasons and to ensure that children's vision is not impeded. Hair should not be cut too short and should not have designs / tramlines shaven into it.

Hairstyles should be smart and moderate in style. Brightly coloured hair is not permitted. Large, excessive hair accessories should not be worn; however, small hair clips or plain headbands or ribbons in brown, black or maroon are acceptable.

At the Headteacher's discretion, there may be exceptions to the above in extreme circumstances e.g. a pupil may be permitted to cover their hair if they have hair loss / illness etc.

Make-Up

Pupils are not allowed to wear make-up or nail varnish. False nails are not permitted.

Labelling

All clothing, shoes, water bottles and school bags should be clearly labelled with your child's name. Any lost clothing is to be taken to the lost property box. All lost property is retained for a term and is disposed of if it is not collected within this time.

The school and Local Authority do not accept liability for loss or damage to personal property and we therefore do not encourage children to bring such items, including toys to school. Mobile phones are not permitted unless prior consent has been given from Mr Whiteland.

E-Safety

Below is some important information on the school's policies on taking photographs of children. <u>Using Images Safely and Responsibly</u>

We all enjoy and treasure images of our family and friends. Our new-born baby, first steps, family events, holidays and school events are moments we all like to capture in photos or on video. We then have the added and exciting dimension of adding our images and video to our social network, such as Facebook, YouTube and many other online websites. Online Images and Video. What should we think about before adding online any images or video? Are there any risks?

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- Some children are at risk and MUST NOT have their image put online. Not all members of the school community will know who they are.
- Some people do not want their images online for personal or religious reasons.
- Some children and staff may have a complex family background which means that image sharing online can have unforeseen consequences.

We must all 'Think Before We Post' Online.

At Welwyn St. Mary's School we are happy for parents and carers to take photos and video of the school events and productions for personal use but request that these images are not distributed or put online. This is to protect all members of the school community.
